We understand

• The Charlotte Mason Elementary Tutorial program follows Charlotte Mason's educational philosophy. We have read either *For the Children's Sake, When Children Love to Learn,* and have attended one of the pre-registration orientation sessions in order to understand what will be involved:

Mom's initials: Dad's initials:

- The Charlotte Mason Elementary Tutorial is NOT a school; that we, as parents, are the primary teachers of our children. The tutors will provide parents with weekly assignments and we will work with our children on those assignments on days the tutorial does not meet. By participating in a tutorial, parents commit to making sure that the syllabus assignments are completed as assigned. If we feel that an assignment needs to be adjusted in some way, it is our responsibility to work that out with the tutor involved. If our children have difficulty with the assignments made by the tutors, it is our responsibility to communicate with the tutor as soon as we realize that a problem exists.
- The Charlotte Mason Elementary Tutorial does not require that parents and/or students sign a specific statement of faith. We do intend to be respectful of the differences that may exist among our students and have no desire to undermine parental authority. Parents need to be comfortable with the fact that the tutors will teach from a explicit, unequivocal Christian worldview, which holds to the following convictions:

God eternally exists in three persons (Father, Son, and Spirit) and that the Lord our God is one (Deut. 6.4), having the same nature, attributes, perfections, worthy of worship.

Man was created male and female, perfect and good, in the image of God, but through disobedience, fell into sin; that through man's fall, death entered the world and all mankind became subject to its effects. (Gen 1:26, 2:17; Romans 3:10-19/Psalm 14.1-3; Ephesians 2: 1-3) And that all are in need of redemption.

Jesus: That In the fullness of time, Jesus came according to the promises given in the Law and the Prophets, (Hebrews 1:1-4) That He is, in the words of the Nicene creed, "very God of very God, begotten, not made," fully God and fully man "by whom all things were made." That He "died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that He was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that He appeared to [Peter], then to the twelve. Then He appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time" (1 Corinthians 15:1-6); that by grace we are saved, through faith, not according to our works (Ephesians 2:8-9) but according to His work on the Cross for us (Colossians 2:11-15), that having received His salvation, we are eternally secure in it (Eph. 1:13-14, Phil. 1:6), that His kingdom never ends.

The Holy Spirit: that He is "the Lord, and Giver of Life, who with the Father and the Son together is worshipped and glorified: who spoke by the prophets," our Comforter whom the Father has sent to teach us all things (John 14:26), and lead us into all truth (John 16:3).

(And lest we leave anything out: As an organization, we affirm the historical creeds: The Apostle's, The Nicene)

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The Scriptures: The events recounted in the Scriptures are true and occurred in real historical time, in real historical places, to real historical people. That they are complete (Psalm 12:6-7, 2 Peter 1.21) and God-breathed (2 Timothy 3; 15) and reliable. It is important that parents understand that our commitment to the true truth of the Scriptures means that we assume a literal interpretation of a text unless the text, itself, signals that another reading is called for (Psalm 17:8 "under the shadow of his wings"). We believe that the Genesis accounts of Creation, the Flood, and the Tower of Babel are historically true, that the events described in the Scriptures happened in real time, in real places, to real men and women. This will have implications for the way we approach science and history.]

While not every book we read will be written by men and women who share these convictions, every book will be approached in light of a worldview that is consistent with these beliefs.

This tutorial has a zero tolerance policy regarding gossip. To quote Dave Ramsey:

"It may be human nature for people to talk about each other, but that doesn't mean you have to put up with it. It is impossible to create a unified team with a bunch of gossips. Gossip pushes people apart instead of pulling them together, and everyone knows you can't trust a gossip. Gossip is unfair to everyone involved. It's unfair to the gossipers because they must toil in a problem situation with no hope of resolution. It's unfair to others who hear the gossip because it undermines passion for their work, confidence in their leadership and belief in your vision."

In addition, we are convinced that it is unfair to our children because of the example it sets for them. Nothing sucks the joy out of the life a group faster than gossip.

Problems will undoubtedly happen. When they do, we will discuss them with those who have the power to productively resolve them, remembering that our primary responsibility toward one another is found in Colossians 3:12-14:

Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you must also forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony.

In any conflict with another we will do everything we can to humbly address the problem with the individual(s) involved first, following the pattern laid out for us in Matthew 18:15.

That FSSC Charlotte Mason Elementary Tutorial is not a school, and thus will not be keeping cumulative records or transcripts. Neither will we be administering standardized tests. All standardized testing/cumulative records should be arranged for/kept by the parents or by the overseeing organization of their choice. While Charlotte Mason Elementary tutors will communicate regularly with the parents about student progress or difficulties observed during class time, it will be the parents' responsibility to determine and report final grades to the organization of their own choosing.

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- That tutors will provide parents with weekly assignments and we will work with our children on those assignments on days the tutorial does not meet. By participating in a tutorial, parents commit to making sure that the syllabus assignments are completed as assigned. If we feel that an assignment needs to be adjusted in some way, it is our responsibility to work that out with the tutor involved. If our children have difficulty with the assignments made by the tutors, it is our responsibility to communicate with the tutor as soon as we realize that a problem exists.
- That the full year's tuition and administration fees are non-refundable, whether we finish out the year at CMET or not. If we have taken advantage of the monthly payment plan, we agree to provide dated checks for the entire year before school starts and to honor all outstanding payments due for the entire school year.

We agree to honor these checks regardless of whether or not we finish the year's program.

If we change banks during the school year, it is our responsibility to notify the program director of the change as soon as possible, and to bring replacement checks to the director immediately.
